

Scope for completing this form

We reviewed the structural drawings for the original construction and carried out a site visit to verify that the existing drawings matched the existing structure to the best of our knowledge. An ASCE 41-17 Tier 1 evaluation was completed. We did not perform an ASCE 41 Tier 1 nonstructural evaluation, but we looked for potentially hazardous nonstructural components during our site visit.

Description of CAAN assignments

The Music Center is a cluster of structures that are separated from each other by expansion joints. As shown in the layout plan below, for the purpose of seismic evaluation, the buildings will be sub-divided into four CAANs. The Music Center, consisting of the Practice Studios/Class Lab, Recital Hall, and Ensemble Rehearsal Room (CAAN 7922, 7922.1, 7922.2) was designed in 1995 by the architectural office of Antoine S. Predock and the structural office of Robin E. Parke Associates. Soon after, the Music Building addition (CAAN 7922.3) was designed by the architectural office of Boora Architects and the structural office of KPFF Consulting Engineers.

This report is for the Music Center Ensemble Rehearsal Wing (CAAN 7922.2).

Brief description of structure

The Ensemble Rehearsal Wing consists of a 1 to 2-story structure, 12,500 sq. ft. gross area, with a tall 1-story Ensemble Rehearsal Hall at the center of the building. The Ensemble Rehearsal Hall is 32 feet in height from Level 1 slab on grade to the high point of the roof parapet. The foundation and walls of the Ensemble Rehearsal Hall are separated by an expansion joint from the surrounding structure.

The Ensemble Rehearsal Wing is adjacent to the Recital Hall (CAAN 7922.1) and a 1" expansion joint separates the two buildings. A 1" expansion joint also separates the building from the adjacent Practice Studios/Class Lab structure (CANN 7922) to the east.

<u>Foundation system:</u> The structure lies on moderately sloping ground. The building walls are founded on continuous strip footings.

<u>Identification of levels:</u> Level 1 is at elevation 643'-10" and Level 2 (which corresponds to the low roof elevation of the structure) is at elevation 656'-8". The roof is inclined between elevation 675'-4" at the west end to elevation 669'-8" at the east end, both measured at the top of the parapet.

<u>Structural system for vertical (gravity) load:</u> Reinforced and fully-grouted concrete masonry (CMU) walls support Level 2 and the roof. The Level 2 floor and roof framing consist of 2.5" thick concrete fill over 1.5" deep metal deck, spanning to steel W-beams which bear on the CMU walls.

Structural system for lateral forces: The concrete fill over metal deck diaphragm at the floor and roof is anchored to the perimeter and interior CMU walls by means of two 3/4" diameter anchor bolts at each beam connection with the wall. In addition, the metal deck is attached with puddle welds to ledgers anchored into the CMU walls, all around the building perimeter.

At the Ensemble Rehearsal Hall roof, the steel beams that support the deck typically span east-west, so the walls on the east and west sides of the building are anchored to the roof diaphragm by both the beam connections and the puddle welds, but walls on the north and south sides of the building are anchored to the roof diaphragm with the puddle weld-to-ledger angle connection only.

Brief description of seismic deficiencies and expected seismic performance including mechanism of nonlinear response and structural behavior modes

The following seismic deficiency is identified:

• The connection of the concrete fill over metal deck roof diaphragm to the north and south walls of the Ensemble Rehearsal Hall relies on spot welds to a ledger angle running along the walls. The capacity of the welds is inadequate for lateral support of the top of the CMU wall.

Other seismic deficiencies include:

- The expansion joint between the Ensemble Rehearsal Wing and the adjacent Recital Hall (CAAN 7922.1) is 1" wide. It is likely that the gap is too small and that pounding might occur between the buildings in the case of a significant seismic event. Because the floors of the adjacent buildings do not align, the second floor and roof of the Ensemble Rehearsal Building would pound on the east concrete wall of the Recital Hall which has no floors at these elevations, and at roof level is at a higher elevation than that of the Ensemble Rehearsal building.
- In addition to the expansion joint between buildings, the foundation and walls of the Ensemble Rehearsal Hall are separated by a 1" expansion joint from the surrounding structure, except at the roof level where it is connected to the roof of the surrounding structure. Pounding may occur at the second floor/low roof, in which case the floor would pound on the CMU walls of the Ensemble Rehearsal Hall which has no floors at these elevations
- The roof-to-wall connection of the concrete fill over metal deck roof diaphragm to the walls, in the east-west direction for the Ensemble Rehearsal Hall, and north-south direction for the West wing consist of two 3/4" diameter anchor bolts at each W-beam and spot welds to the ledger angles along the walls. The margin of safety for transmitting the diaphragm seismic forces to the shear walls is small and should be re-examined. Current research suggests that welded connections of metal deck to supporting steel provide less ductility than other connection types such as fasteners.

Summary of review of non-structural life-safety concerns, including at exit routes.3

We walked through all floors of the building. We did not perform the Tier 1 nonstructural evaluation, but we looked for potentially hazardous nonstructural components during our site visit on 20 May 2019. As shown in the table below, no non-structural hazards were observed.

³ For these Tier 1 evaluations, we do not visit all spaces of the building; we rely on campus staff to report to us their understanding of if and where non-structural hazards may occur.

Discussion of Rating

The connection of the concrete fill over metal deck roof diaphragm to the north and south walls of the Ensemble Rehearsal Hall is inadequate for lateral support of the CMU walls. A rating of V reflects this deficiency, in addition to other connection vulnerabilities as described above.

Recommendations for further evaluation or retrofit

While the CMU walls are adequately sized to resist a BSE-C level seismic event and possibly larger, the connection of the concrete fill over metal deck roof diaphragm to the north and south walls of the Ensemble Rehearsal Hall is inadequate for lateral support of the CMU walls. Further evaluation is also needed for the connection of roof to wall, which consists of two 3/4" diameter anchor bolts at each W-beam in addition to spot welds to a ledger angle along the perimeter of the walls. The capacity of these connections approaches the diaphragm seismic force transfer demands to the CMU walls and should be evaluated further for the purpose of retrofit.

Peer review of rating

This seismic evaluation was discussed in a peer review meeting on 24 July 2019. Reviewers present were Bret Lizundia of R+C and Jay Yin of Degenkolb. Comments from the reviewers have been incorporated into this report. The reviewers agreed with the assigned rating.








Annotated 2nd Floor Plan of Rehearsal Wing




East Elevation of Ensemble Rehearsal Wing with Recital Hall (CAAN 7922.1) behind
